"We have in our generation witnessed the Jewish People returning to the Land of Promise. The prophecies, about their returning from the isles and the distant places of the earth (Isaiah 11:10- 11.41:8ff. Jeremiah 31:8.), did not and could not refer to Israel's return from Babylon. It has taken place, in our generation, so that we have a right to say that this is a fulfilment of prophecy. We have seen Israel (the fig tree), which ceased to be a nation for nineteen hundred years, become a nation and a state once more in the Promised Land. Clearly God is at work.
